



N. C. Licensure Controversy

In N.C., there has been controversy between the Board of Examiners for Speech and Language Pathologists and Audiologists and the State Department of Public Instruction concerning the public school hearing screening programs. The Board has received complaints alleging that speech-language pathologists were practicing audiology (i.e., air and bone thresholds SRT, speech discrimination, impedance, and acoustic reflex tests). The expressed position of the Board has been consistent with the licensing law, ASHA Code of Ethics, and ASHA Guidelines for Hearing Screening Programs.

SCSHA SPRING CONVENTION IN CHARLESTON

The sect-annual meeting of the South Carolina Speech and Hearing Association will be held in Charleston this Friday and Saturday, April 19-20. Dr. Hayes A. Newby, author of the well-known text in Audiology and past president of the American Speech and Hearing Association, will be the principal guest of our Association this meeting. Dr. Kenneth O. Johnson, Exceptive Secretary of ASHA, and Dr. Carter Bagley of the Medical College of South Carolina will also speak.

Friday evening there will be a cocktail party and boat cruise of Charleston harbor. The meeting will be over at noon on Saturday.

The meeting will be held at Charleston Inn beginning Friday morning with registration from 8:30 to 10:00 A. X. Registration fee will be \$4.00 for members and guests, excluding students, Student fee will be \$2.00. This fee will include the cocktail party and boat trip. All meals are dutch treat. Room reservations may be made directly with Charleston Inn. Single rooms range in price from \$7.50 to \$10.00. Double/Twin rooms range from \$13.00 to \$18.00.

SUMMER SPEECH PROGRAMS AT CITADEL AND FURMAN UNIVERSITY

Mr. Owens Corder, Chief Supervisor, Program for Exceptional Children, State Dept. of Education, has announced that Furman University and The Citadel will offer twelve credit hours of Speech during the summer of 1968. These courses will be offered as

Furman University
June 10 - July 12:

Articulation

July 15 - August 16: Principles of Speech Correction

The Citadel June 10 - July 19:

Articulation July 22 - August 23: Principles of Speech Correction Practicum in Speech

Both schools offer these courses on a graduate or an undergraduate level. At Furman University, tuition is \$45 per course; room and board are \$150 per term. At The Citadel, tuition is \$45 per undergraduate course and \$60 per graduate course.

No room and board are available on campus at The Citadel. Mr. Corder stated that his department is trying to make arrangements for room and board at The Citadel.

NEWS FROM SPARTANBURG CLINIC

Ever since the establishment of the Spartanburg Speech and Hearing Clinic in the early 1950's it has been operated on a nine month, plus summer session basis. Dr. art Weiss reports that plans have now been made to change the clinic schedule to a continuous twelve month basis. However, the public school therapy staff will still follow the regular public school schedule and, very often, these people will also work in the clinic's special six-week summer session which still will be available for the staff of t able for those clients desiring a special summer session of speech therapy.

Proposed New Speech and Hearing Clinic

Application has been made for funds to build a new speech and hearing clinic from the U. S. Appalachia program. The proposed new facility will be a part of the larger Charles Lea Center for Rehabilitation and Special Education, Inc. in Spartanburg. Although the Appalachia funds have been temporarily frozen, it is hoped that they will be released sometime during the next fiscal year.

Six-County Cooperative Program Proposed

The speech and hearing clinics of Greenville, Spartanburg and Anderson have developed a cooperative program to service the six-county Appalachia area of upper South Carolina. A proposal amounting to about \$500,000 or more has been completed and will be submitted to the Appalachia office in Washington, D. C. within the next few days, according to Dr. Arthur Weiss, director of the Spartanburg Speech and Mearing Clinic. This proposal includes support and development of both clinical and public school type programs.

On February 23 the staff of the Charleston Speech and Hearing Clinic visited the Columbia Clinic, and in the afternoon heard a lecture by Dr. Scherer of North-western University. Her lecture dealt with establishing programs for hearing impaired children. She was serving as a consultant to the State Planning Committee for the Hearing Impaired, of which Mrs. Alice White of the Charleston Clinic is a member.
