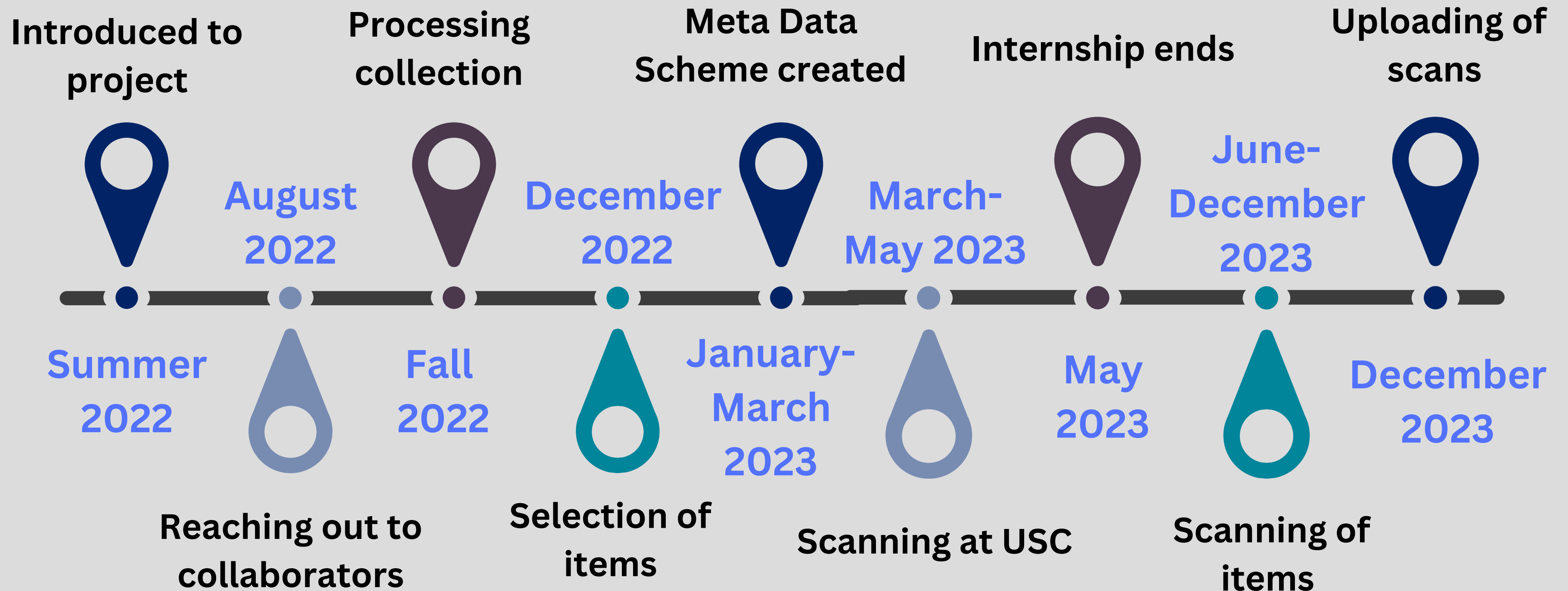

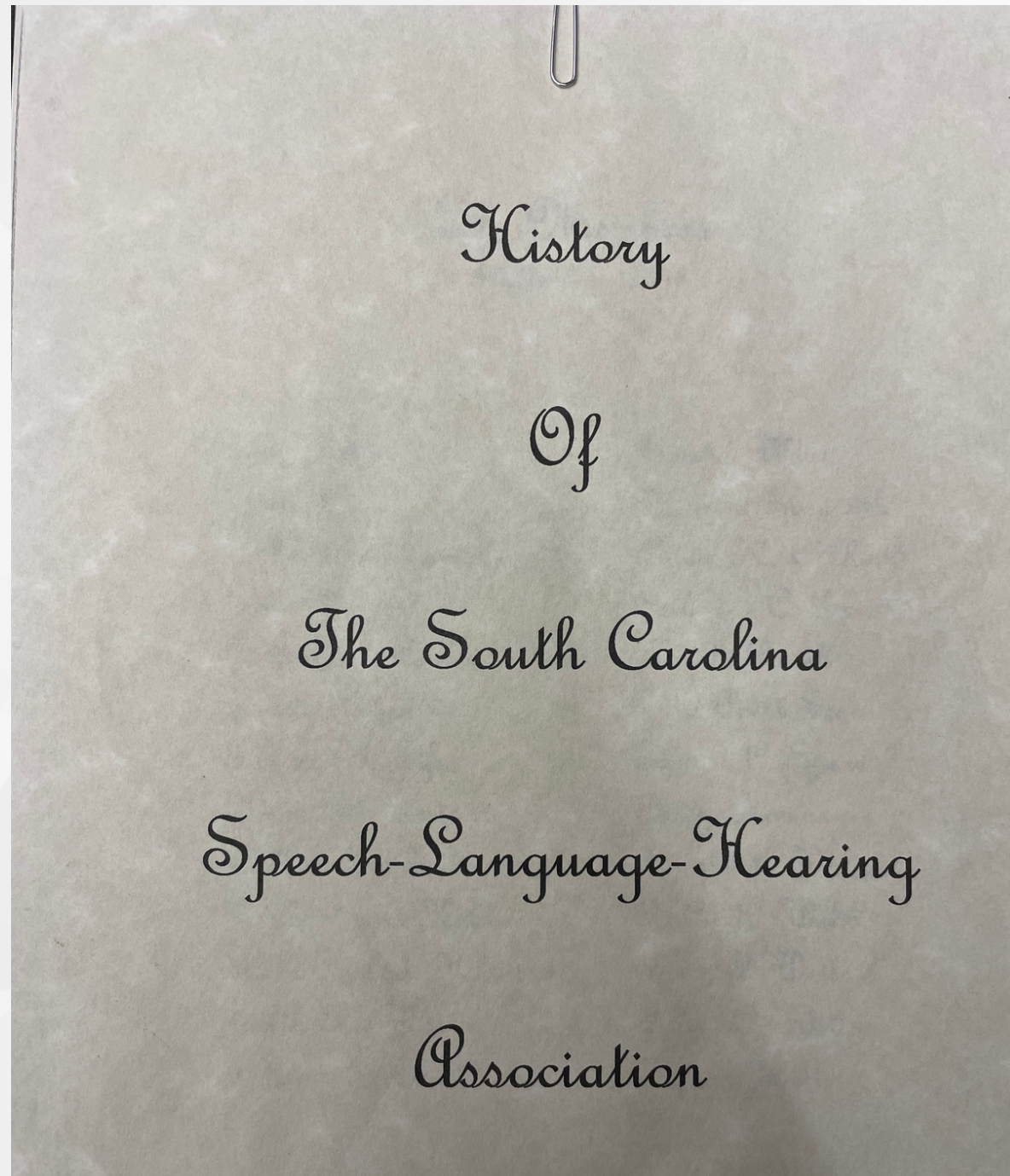



### SCSHA Name Change Official

Results from the vote of the membership have been tallied and SCSHA will have an official name change as of May 1, 1984. The proposal made by Aileen Weiss in the form of motion at the convention was supported almost unanimously by the membership. The change to the South Carolina Speech Language Hearing Association will not change the acronym SCSHA, and the Association has agreed to use up old stationary so that the name change would not necessitate undue expenses.

### Minges Elected to Legislative Council

Geraldine "Gerry" S. Minges has been chosen to serve on the Legislative Council as a representative from S.C. for a 3 year term beginning January 1, 1985. Ms. Minges is a Clinical Instructor/Supervisor for the Department of Communicative Disorders at the U.S.C. Speech and Hearing Clinic. She received a Master of Education degree in Speech Pathology in 1973 from U.S.C. and has her CCC-Sp. She is Co-Chairman of the SCSHA Continuing Education Committee and Chapter Advisor for the U.S.C. NSSHA. She received the ACE in September 1983. Elizabeth "Betsy" E. Davis, Director of Speech/Language/Hearing Services, SCDMR, Midlands Center will serve as alternate Legislative Councillor.

### N. C. Licensure Controversy

In N.C., there has been controversy between the Board of Examiners for Speech and Language Pathologists and Audiologists and the State Department of Public Instruction concerning the public school hearing screening programs. The Board has received complaints alleging that speech-language pathologists were practicing audiology (i.e., air and bone thresholds SRT, speech discrimination, impedance, and acoustic reflex tests). The expressed position of the Board has been consistent with the licensing law, ASHA Code of Ethics, and ASHA Guidelines for Hearing Screening Programs.

### Elementary Principals Seek Physical Education Teachers

Elementary school principals in the Columbia Public School System feel that trained physical education teachers are needed in the elementary schools of the district. The principals have recommended to the School Board of Richland District One the employment of additional elementary teachers to be used in physical education. The recommendation was made by a special committee appointed by the elementary principals of the district in anticipation of legislation which would distribute state aid to teachers on a different basis. The elementary principals were surveyed by the committee to determine needs. In a report to the board, the principals noted that "the demands on her time, energy and skill have become almost impossible for the elementary teacher to meet. It is quite evident that leaders in education and committees for the study of elementary schools are recognizing this fact. The Honorable Robert McNair, Governor of South

the quality of instruction and to meet some of the unmet needs of elementary school children. "In his State of the State message," the principals continued, "he recommended that the formula for the distribution of state aid to teachers be changed from a ratio of one to 30 to one to 26. He later explained that this was not intended just to reduce class size but to provide other special personnel who would enrich the total elementary curriculum." The committee of elementary school principals was appointed to determine what the elementary principals felt to be the area of greatest need. Additional physical education teachers was rated as the greatest need on the elementary school level. Other needs expressed were additional help in the areas of guidance, administration, remedial reading, music and art.

## NEWS FROM SPARTANBURG CLINIC

### New Twelve-Month Clinic Schedule

Ever since the establishment of the Spartanburg Speech and Hearing Clinic in the early 1950's it has been operated on a nine month, plus summer session basis. Dr. Art Weiss reports that plans have now been made to change the clinic schedule to a continuous twelve month basis. However, the public school therapy staff will still follow the regular public school schedule and, very often, these people will also work in the clinic's special six-week summer session which still will be available for those clients desiring a special summer session of speech therapy.

### Proposed New Speech and Hearing Clinic

Application has been made for funds to build a new speech and hearing clinic from the U. S. Appalachia program. The proposed new facility will be a part of the larger Charles Lea Center for Rehabilitation and Special Education, Inc. in Spartanburg. Although the Appalachia funds have been temporarily frozen, it is hoped that they will be released sometime during the next fiscal year.

### Six-County Cooperative Program Proposed

The speech and hearing clinics of Greenville, Spartanburg and Anderson have developed a cooperative program to service the six-county Appalachia area of upper South Carolina. A proposal amounting to about \$500,000 or more has been completed and will be submitted to the Appalachia office in Washington, D. C. within the next few days, according to Dr. Arthur Weiss, director of the Spartanburg Speech and Hearing Clinic. This proposal includes support and development of both clinical and public school type programs.

## CHARLESTON STAFF VISITS COLUMBIA CLINIC

On February 23 the staff of the Charleston Speech and Hearing Clinic visited the Columbia Clinic, and in the afternoon heard a lecture by Dr. Scherer of Northwestern University. Her lecture dealt with establishing programs for hearing impaired children. She was serving as a consultant to the State Planning Committee for the Hearing Impaired, of which Mrs. Alice White of the Charleston Clinic is a member.

## WORKSHOP IN BEAUFORT

On March 12 and 13 in Beaufort a workshop was conducted to introduce cued speech to parents and teachers of hard of hearing. Twenty-five people participated in the two-day program which was conducted by Mr. Van Porter, Consultant, State Dept. of Education, Dr. Barbara Powell, S. C. State College and Mr. Adam Rauch, Savannah Speech and Hearing Clinic.

Friday evening there will be a cocktail party and boat cruise of Charleston harbor. The meeting will be over at noon on Saturday.

The meeting will be held at Charleston Inn beginning Friday morning with registration from 8:30 to 10:00 A. M. Registration fee will be \$4.00 for members and guests, excluding students. ### SUMMER SPEECH PROGRAMS AT CITADEL AND FURMAN UNIVERSITY

### Dear Editor:

For nearly half a century, May has been designated Better Hearing and Speech Month in the nation by Presidential proclamation. The ability to develop language skills and to exchange ideas verbally is unique to human beings. Communication is the binding force in every human culture and the dominant influence in the personal life of every one of us. A breakdown in these crucial communicative skills is considered one of the most dehumanizing experiences in life.

But today, more than 20 million Americans - nearly ten percent of all children and adults in the United States - have speech, language or hearing impairments which severely affect their abilities to communicate. And tragically, many of these individuals are suffering needlessly - since most communication disorders can be helped by trained professionals.

The American Speech and Hearing Association is the national scientific and professional society of more than 25,000 speech - language pathologists and audiologists whose concerns include the systems that make communication possible; the causes and effects of disturbance in human communication; and the identification, evaluation and rehabilitation of individuals afflicted with speech, language and hearing disorders. The evaluative and therapeutic services required by persons with such disorders are made available through a variety of clinical settings, rehabilitation centers, programs of special pupil services in schools and private facilities.

There can be no better time than now, during the month of May, for all Americans to dedicate themselves to meeting the needs of the more than 20 million Americans who have communicative handicaps.

## Sheila Bailey Is New Poster Child

The Executive Council of the South Carolina Speech-Language-Hearing Association recently selected Sheila Bailey of Lake City to serve as the 1987 Poster Child.

A poster child is chosen each year to aid in the promotion of May is Better Hearing and Speech Month. Further, she will represent individuals who have communicative impairments in the Association's efforts to heighten public awareness of speech, language and hearing problems throughout the year.

Sheila will be presented at the Association's luncheon during the annual convention in Hilton Head in March and will meet with Governor Campbell in late April when he proclaims May as Better Hearing and Speech Month in South Carolina.

Sheila is an 11-year-old who has a moderate bilateral hearing loss. She is receiving audiological services from the Pee Dee Speech and Hearing Center in Florence.

Her audiologist at the center, Mary Anne Larkin, feels that Sheila has "met the emotional, social and psychological challenges facing someone who has a communicative disorder."

According to Ms. Larkin, Sheila volunteers her time to speak to children and adults about her hearing loss and the benefits of amplification (hearing aids). "She strongly feels that acceptance and positive mental attitude toward one's handicap is the first prerequisite towards adjusting and coping," Ms. Larkin said.

Sheila attends Lake City Elementary No. 2, where she is in the fourth grade. She received services as an itinerant teacher of the hearing impaired from grades K-5, but to her progress, no longer receives those services. Sheila resides in Lake City with her parents, Danny and Elaine Bailey, and her brother Re-

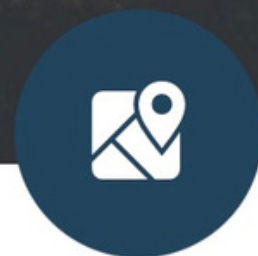

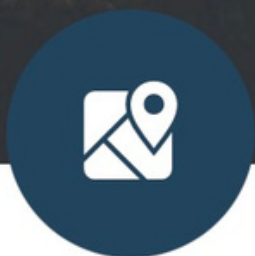

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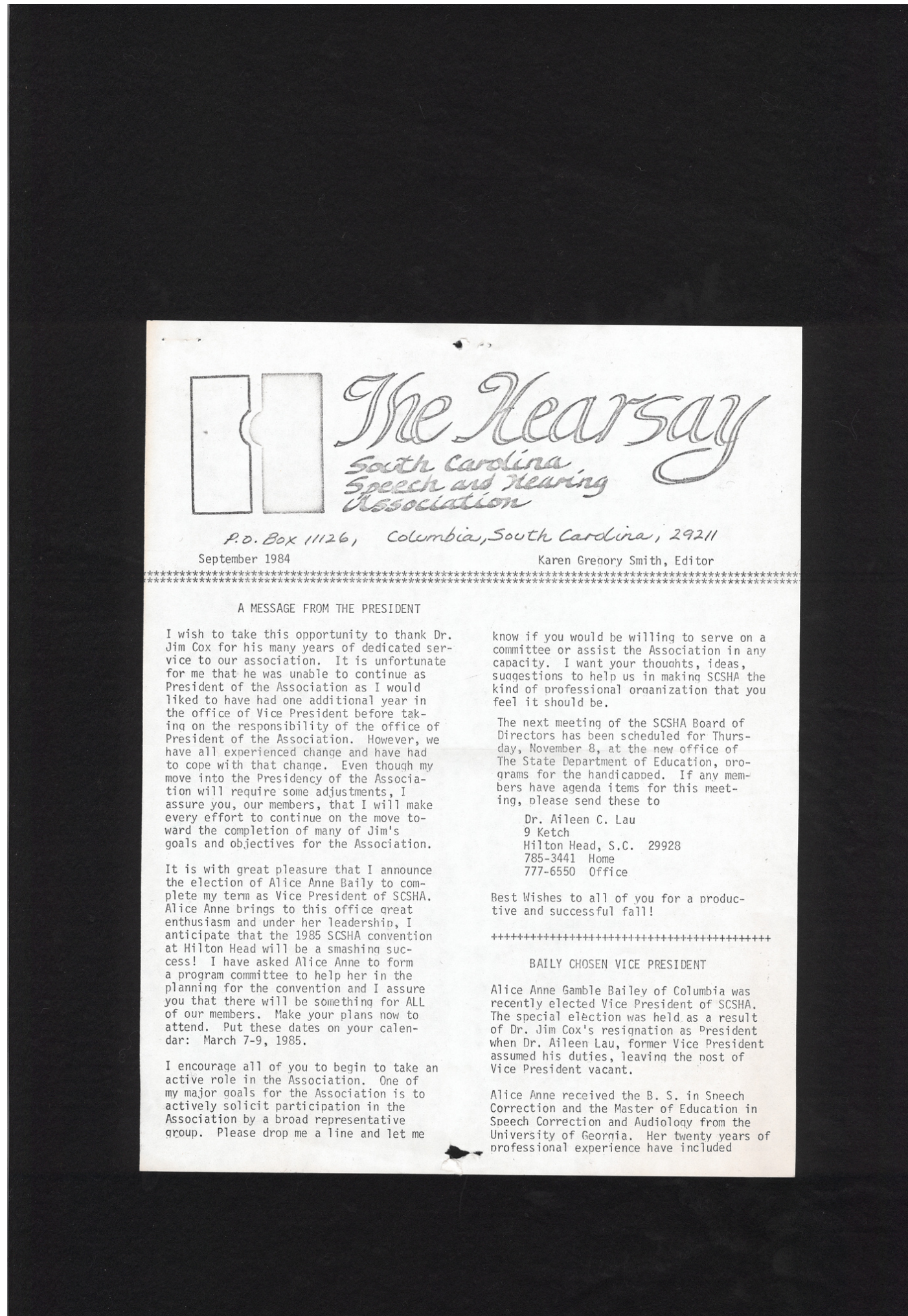
